2024 was an exceptional year for the Assiniboine Park Conservancy, and a powerful reminder of the joy, connection, and sense of belonging that nature brings to our lives. In so many meaningful ways, the Park continues to be a place where people come together, find inspiration, and deepen their connection to the natural world.

From the stunning debut of Fleurs de Villes VOYAGE at The Leaf to a series of immersive seasonal floral displays, our horticultural programming created spaces of beauty, reflection, and cultural celebration.

At the Zoo, the opening of Xtreme Bugs and Defenses of the Animal Kingdom delighted visitors, while our teams worked hard behind the scenes to coordinate vital animal moves, respond to evolving accreditation standards, and advance the Zoo Master Plan. The arrival of guanacos, red-crowned cranes, and other new species brought the wonder of wildlife to our guests.

In the Park, the refreshed Nature Playground opened with new accessibility features and beautiful sculptures by Joe Fafard. The redevelopment of our cricket facilities moved forward, supported by community and corporate partners, setting the stage for more competitive events and return to play in 2026.

Our Conservation and Research team reached new milestones, including a record-setting release of 210 endangered butterflies, expanded eDNA research, and the installation of a Motus tracking tower to support migratory species monitoring. These efforts reflect our ongoing commitment to protecting wildlife and wild places here in the Park and beyond.

Moments of connection were also created through community events and programs that welcomed thousands to the Park, Zoo, and Leaf. These experiences are more than events; they are opportunities to bring people together in joyful, memorable ways.

None of this would be possible without our passionate staff, dedicated volunteers, generous donors and sponsors, and the continued partnership of government and community organizations. Your belief in the Park and our mission enables us to grow, evolve, and serve more people every year.

As we look to the future, we do so with a deep sense of gratitude and optimism. Thank you for helping us make Assiniboine Park a place where nature and community come together.

They provide leadership, valuable guidance, and essential connections to the communities we serve. The Board of Directors includes representation from the City of Winnipeg as well as accomplished and respected leaders in our business, philanthropic, Indigenous, and post-secondary communities.



CAPITAL DEVELOPMENT AND REFURBISHMENT

Assiniboine Park Zoo

Over the course of the year, numerous projects were completed to support improvements to the visitor experience and animal care facilities as part of ongoing operations and in preparation for renewal of our accreditation with the Association of Zoos and Aquariums in 2025.

Highlights include construction of a new patio at the Bison Snack Shack and habitat improvements for the Zoo's Turkmenian markhor, mara, primates, and other species in Toucan Ridge. Work was also completed in preparation for the arrival of lemurs in early 2025.

In 2024, significant progress was made on plans for a new **Animal Health Centre**. The proposed new facility will support more advanced veterinary care, updated technology, and a public viewing area showcasing the work of our team supporting animals in our care. In December, the City of Winnipeg confirmed an early funding commitment for the project. APC is pursuing additional support from other levels of government and the private sector.

Park Improvements

In January and February, **winter recreation** enthusiasts took advantage of enhancements to the Park's cross-country ski amenities including a new trail map and signage, winter equipment rentals in partnership with Winnipeg Trails Association, and ski racks located at the Riley Family Duck Pond and The Leaf. Planning also got underway to support infrastructure improvements required to further enhance winter experiences in the Park.

Since 2011, the **Nature Playground** has been a very popular gathering place for children and families, but after 13 years, it was time for a refresh. Work completed during a temporary spring closure included re-surfacing of rubberized pathways and play features, a new wheelchair accessible willow tree tunnel, painting, and repairs to playground features.

The refresh also included installation of a new wheelchair accessible swing with support from The Winnipeg Foundation and a new piece of public art thanks to a donation by Michael Nesbitt. The sculpture, created by

artist Joe Fafard, is a combination of scenes, objects, and fragments in the shape of seven running horses.

A major upgrade of the Park's **cricket facilities** was completed over the spring and summer. The project included redesign of the existing field to create two full-size cricket pitches, turf replacement, a new irrigation system, and new batting and bowling cages. The project will support the growth of cricket in Manitoba and opportunities to host regional, national, and international tournaments. Active play will resume in 2026.

In November, APC announced a new 10-year partnership recognized with naming of the Princess Auto Cricket Field. Support was also received from the Province of Manitoba, City of Winnipeg, and Mondetta Canada Inc.

The Leaf

In 2024, work continued to address incomplete projects and construction deficiencies. This work was overseen by APC staff who were also managing the unique and complex day to day operations of this one-of-a-kind facility.



ZOO NEWS

Acquisitions

Chad, a male blue-billed **curassow**, arrived in April from Nashville Zoo. He can be found in Toucan Ridge and is a charismatic ambassador for his critically endangered species.

Male **red panda** Kelly arrived in May from Zoo de Granby in Quebec. His transfer was recommended by the AZA Red Panda SSP* as a future breeding match for female Tanvi.

In September, female **Goeldi's monkey**Lea arrived from a facility in Saskatoon and joined her daughter Calli in Toucan Ridge.
Her transfer was approved by the AZA
Callimico SSP.*

Julia, a female **great horned owl**, arrived from the Canadian Raptor Conservancy in Ontario in September and quickly settled into her new habitat outside Toucan Ridge.

In October, **red-crowned cranes** Queso (female) and Salsa (male) arrived from the Smithsonian Conservation Biology Institute on a recommendation from the AZA Red-Crowned Crane SSP*

Guanacos Cob (male) and Peaches (female) arrived in late fall and moved into a habitat in the Open Range section of the Zoo.

Female **domestic yak** Mooshu arrived in May from Parc Safari in Quebec. Louise, another female, arrived from Riverview Park and Zoo at the end of the year.

Births

In spring, we celebrated the births of two **reindeer**, a female calf named Doe-reen and a male calf named Freddy. We also celebrated the births of four **red kangaroo** joeys.

Notable Departures

In August, female **cougar** Teeka was transferred to Toronto Zoo. We also facilitated the transfer of a sunbittern, red kangaroo, and three demoiselle cranes following recommendations from their respective species SSP Programs.

Seasonal Exhibits

Defenses of the Animal Kingdom

introduced visitors to the strange and fascinating ways animals protect themselves using claws, teeth, venom, and more. Featured species included the four-toed

hedgehog, three-banded armadillo, and Linnaeus's two-toed sloth, plus a variety of insects, arachnids, and reptiles.

Presented by Steinbach Credit Union, **Xtreme BUGS** showcased 19 giant animatronic insects along a forested trail, offering an up-close look at their unique features. Highlights included a giant Japanese hornet, praying mantis, and honeybee.

Saving Animals From Extinction

In 2024, APC joined the Red Panda

Saving Animals From Extinction (SAFE) program through the Association of Zoos and Aquariums! SAFE programs are part of the collective effort of accredited zoos and aquariums to positively impact the conservation of animals in the wild. We are also members of the monarch, prairie

butterfly, bison, and North American

songbird SAFE programs.

* Through Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA) Species Survival Plan* (SSP) Programs, accredited Zoos work together to ensure genetic diversity among a population in human care.



LEAF NEWS



From January 11 - 21, The Leaf hosted **Fleurs de Villes VOYAGE**, a stunning display that featured 15 one-of-a-kind floral mannequins created by local florists. The mannequins were inspired by the world's most iconic travel destinations, transforming the space into a vibrant celebration of global beauty and creativity.

Over 25,000 visitors took in the display, admiring mannequins inspired by an Indian wedding, Ethiopian coffee ceremony, Chinese dragon, the Icelandic highlands of Thórsmörk, and more.

Seasonal Displays

In 2024, the horticulture team at The Leaf created five uniquely themed displays in the Babs Asper Display House.

Flora of the Philippines (January 23 – March 17) featured colourful orchids and drew inspiration from the tropical forests that define the breathtaking landscapes of the Philippines.

Brasil Moderno (March 21 – May 26) was inspired by the tropical landscapes of Brazil and the work of renowned landscape architect and environmentalist Roberto Burle Marx.

Garden of Healing (May 30 – September 8) featured a dramatic, suspended floral art installation created by Indigenous designers Carmen Grey and Mamie Griffith using medicinal and sacred plants.

Yasuragi (September 13 – November 17) paid homage to Japanese garden design, which is renowned for its artistry, minimalist philosophy, and stunning simplicity.

Birdsong & Boughs: A Holiday Migration

(November 23 – January 12) drew parallels between travelers returning home for the holidays and migrating birds seeking warmth and refuge.

New Experiences

The year began with the launch of **Leaf After Dark**, an evening series featuring live music, food and drink, and a vibrant, adults-only atmosphere. The events were quickly embraced by the community, with many evenings selling out in advance.

In May, **Carnival at The Leaf** celebrated the vibrant rhythms and colours of Brazil with live entertainment by Viva Brasil Canada. In November, the **Threads of Tradition** fashion show highlighted the beauty of traditional and contemporary Japanese attire.

In summer, **Bevvies, Bites & Hot Summer Nights** offered a unique experience in the Kitchen Garden. Each evening featured guided tours, wood-fired focaccia, and a relaxed garden vibe that appealed to food lovers and green thumbs alike.

Educational programs explored topics such as fermentation, canning and preserving, tea sampling, cocktail making, Métis beading, and container gardening. Culinary highlights included regular foodie events and a baking series for junior chefs.

These diverse experiences reflect APC's commitment to offering dynamic programming that celebrates culture, nature, and community all year long.



COMMUNITY EVENTS AND ENGAGEMENT

Signature Events

NEW On June 13 and 14, the Zoo hosted a new after-hours event called Locked Zoo - Finders Keepers. Participants worked in teams to crack codes and solve puzzles while learning how we care for our animals.

The **Summer Entertainment Series** presented by Casinos of Winnipeg featured celebrations on Indigenous Peoples Day and Canada Day plus live music, wellness activities, movies, and art from June through August. All events are free thanks to sponsorship, grants, and donor support.

Brew at the Zoo presented by Manitoba Liquor Marts returned to the Zoo on September 13. Guests enjoyed unlimited samples of craft beer and other beverages, live music, an expanded event footprint, and interactive voting for the best booths and brews.

Boo at the Zoo presented by Access Credit Union ran over the course of 21 nights from October 4 – 31, transforming the Zoo with Halloween displays, costumed characters, rides, games, and live performances. New experiences included a caricature artist and adults-only night.

Zoo Lights presented by Red River Coop returned to the Zoo for 35 nights from November 22 – January 5. New holiday displays included a life-sized festive train, Manitoba's largest light maze, and a glow in the snow arcade.

Corporate Social Responsibility

In 2024, 22,500 Community Access

Vouchers offering free admission to The Leaf or Zoo were distributed to people facing health or socio-economic challenges through the United Way and other agencies. With

support from the donor-funded **ParkShare TODAY** program, over 6,250 individuals took part in educational experiences at the Park, Zoo, and Leaf.

On June 6, APC hosted the ninth annual Wildest Dreams event presented by Maple Leaf Construction, partnering with community organizations to offer quests facing health and/or socio-economic challenges a special evening at the Zoo with complimentary admission, food, special activities, and entertainment.

The **LifeTime** program presented by the Kinsmen Club of Winnipeg is delivered in partnership with community organizations that serve older adults facing financial, transportation, or social barriers. Each month, approximately 40 participants enjoyed a guided experience at The Leaf.

COMMUNITY EVENTS AND ENGAGEMENT CONTINUED

Diversity and Inclusion

In late May, APC hosted **Pride in the Park** activities at The Leaf and Zoo as part of our commitment to making all visitors feel welcome, accepted, and comfortable to be themselves. A donation of \$2,545 was made to the Rainbow Resource Centre and Sunshine House.

On September 30, the **National Day for Truth and Reconciliation** (Orange Shirt Day), APC hosted a Sacred Fire in the Indigenous Peoples Garden. Orange lapel ribbons were offered to visitors with a request for donations. Orange t-shirts featuring a custom design were sold at

the Zoo. A donation of \$10,000 was made to the Orange Shirt Society and Circles for Reconciliation.

In November, APC successfully renewed our accreditation as a **Rainbow Registered** attraction, which provides reassurance to 2SLGBTQI+ visitors that they will be welcomed and accepted.

In December, APC became the first Canadian zoo and park to join the **Hidden Disabilities Sunflower Program**, which helps visitors with hidden disabilities discreetly signal they may need extra support, understanding, or time.

Conservation and Sustainability

Throughout the year, family-friendly promotions provided opportunities to learn about wildlife, conservation, and sustainability. Highlights included International Polar Bear Day, Party for the Planet, Endangered Species Weekend, and Red Panda Weekend.

In May, community volunteers took part in a Shoreline Clean-up along the Assiniboine River and a BioBlitz, contributing valuable biodiversity data to support ongoing research in the Park.





FUNDRAISING HIGHLIGHTS

The commitment and dedication of generous community members, corporations, and foundations is a key source of support for APC. Their generosity makes a true difference to the continued operation and success of The Leaf, Park, and Zoo, and we are truly grateful for their support.

Park Champions

The Park Champions annual giving program saw continued success in its second year. Members of the Park Champions program demonstrated just how important Assiniboine Park is to them, and their community, with 83% of donors returning

this year. In addition, 31 new households joined the program with a donation of \$1,500 or greater.

Garden Party

The Leo Mol Sculpture Garden came to life as guests mixed, mingled, and danced the night away under the stars at our signature Garden Party fundraiser in August. Always a soirée to remember, the 2024 Garden Party raised over \$288,000 (net) in conjunction with our fourth annual Online Auction and first annual Online Raffle to support the ongoing maintenance and care of Assiniboine Park, its amenities, and attractions.

Grants

Grants totalling over \$500,000 were awarded to APC in 2024. These contributions will assist with many areas, including expanded and ongoing programming at The Leaf and Zoo through the Goodman School, new winter activities and entertainment, and conservation and research projects such as ongoing beluga monitoring and songbird window collision mitigation work onsite at the Park.







EDUCATION PROGRAMS

2024 was another productive year for the Education and Programs team, which delivered a range of school programs, children's camps, guided tours, and community experiences for visitors of all ages. Designed to inspire curiosity and connection, these programs blend learning with fun, offering meaningful ways for people to engage with nature, conservation, and culture. Here are a few highlights.

Indigenous Youth Storytelling Program

In 2024, APC continued its longstanding commitment to Indigenous youth engagement through the Indigenous Youth Storytelling Program, offered in partnership with Seven Oaks School Division.

Through July and August, high-school students joined elders and knowledge-keepers for cultural workshops while developing skills in belonging, mastery, independence, and generosity through the Circle of Courage model.

Over the summer, participants also worked with artist Kale Sheppard to co-create four murals displayed in the Nature Playground. Students submitted their ideas and drawings, which Sheppard brought to life in a series

of pieces that explore themes of growth, resilience, and inter-cultural unity.

Get Out and Lead

In September, we launched an exciting new training program designed to strengthen interpretive and presentation skills for staff and volunteers in public-facing education roles. Twelve dedicated volunteers and six passionate employees took part in workshops that built confidence, deepened storytelling techniques, and enhanced their ability to connect with visitors in meaningful ways.

The Modern Zoo, You, and Your Student Crew

In October, twenty-six high-school teachers from the Science Teachers of Manitoba took part in a new development program exploring animal welfare, conservation, and zoo-based research. The session offered a behind-the-scenes look at how modern zoos contribute to conservation science, education, and community engagement, equipping teachers with new insights and resources to inspire the next generation of environmental stewards.

Foodie Series

In 2024, The Leaf served up a delicious trio of Foodie Events, each offering guests an unforgettable blend of cuisine, culture, and discovery. February's Valentine's-themed evening featured a romantic three-course menu paired with fine wines and insights into the intriguing world of aphrodisiacs. In April, the flavours of Brazil took centre stage in a vibrant culinary celebration. In October, guest chef Edward Lam of Yujiro delighted diners with an exquisite showcase of Japanese cuisine.

Guided Tours

Throughout the summer, the Education team brought the Gardens at The Leaf and the Zoo to life through guided tours that invited visitors to connect more deeply with nature. In the Gardens at The Leaf, guests explored six unique outdoor spaces, each telling a story about the relationship between people and plants, and the ways in which nature shapes our lives and cultures. On the Journey to Churchill Tour, participants embarked on an immersive adventure, discovering the beauty and challenges of northern ecosystems, the impacts of climate change, and the vital role we can all play in protecting Manitoba's iconic polar bears.





CONSERVATION AND RESEARCH



NEW Conservation Strategy

In January, the Conservation and Research team unveiled a new strategy that will guide our conservation work over the next five years. Projects and goals are organized under four themes: cultivating conservation connections, preventing species extinction, protecting urban biodiversity, and understanding the changing Arctic.

Seals and Satellite Tags

In May, our team travelled to Churchill to capture and tag harbour seals and had our most successful year to date! Six adult seals were equipped with satellite transmitters, which will help us better understand how they use river systems along Manitoba's Arctic coasts.

This research involved representatives from APC's Conservation and Research, Veterinary and Animal Health, and Animal Care teams along with Fisheries and Oceans Canada and the Seal River Watershed Alliance.

Bear-dar Technology

Polar Bears International is working to develop new technology known as "Beardar," a radar system that can be trained to serve as a polar bear early warning system in northern communities like Churchill.

Over the summer, a mobile Bear-dar tower watched over the Zoo's largest polar bear habitat gathering data that will help the technology differentiate between polar bears and other movement on the landscape with greater accuracy.

Grassland Butterfly Conservation

In July and August, APC released 210 critically endangered Poweshiek skipperling in the Manitoba Tall Grass Prairie Preserve and 51 endangered Dakota skipper in Manitoba's Interlake region. This was the highest number of butterflies released annually since the program's inception.

Wild-born Poweshiek skipperling were observed in a site where they were reintroduced for the first time in 2023, an encouraging sign that our efforts to save the species from extinction are working.

Motus Wildlife Tracking Station

In September, APC installed a Motus station on the roof of the Qualico Family Centre, joining a global network that supports research and education on the ecology and conservation of migratory animals. The program uses technology to track small transmitters attached to birds, bats, and large insects, allowing researchers to monitor their movements with remarkable precision over great distances.

Other Highlights

Two visiting students from the Netherlands concluded their research, which found that personality assessments can be a very useful tool for studying and managing the behaviour of polar bears in human care.

As part of our ongoing commitment to bird conservation, window collision mitigation was added to the main entrance at the Zoo.

Purple martins were observed nesting in a purple martin condo beside the Riley Family Duck Pond for the first time since its installation in 2021.

From May to October, 19 APC volunteers helped pilot a program for monitoring the Park's biodiversity using the iNaturalist app. They recorded over 4,900 observations and identified over 700 species including endangered and invasive species.

In 2024, the team started working on an exciting new project that uses cutting-edge species detection technology to track one of Manitoba's most mysterious residents – the Manitoba mudpuppy.



STAFF AND VOLUNTEER RESOURCES

Learning and Development

In 2024, APC delivered mandatory core learning programs for all permanent employees focused on a people-first culture and creating a positive and welcoming workplace.

To support APC's commitment to diversity and inclusion, the final training sessions of the year included a review of APC's accessibility initiatives and training on the

Hidden Disabilities Sunflower Program.In December, APC became the first Canadian zoo and park to join this innovative program.

Awards and Recognition

In May, Shaun Leonoff, APC Manager of Volunteer Resources, was recognized by Volunteer Manitoba with the Barb Gemmell Catalyst **Award for Excellence in Volunteer Management**.

The award recognizes that the ability to inspire and influence is at the core of being a volunteer leader and honours individuals who have distinguished themselves through innovative best practices with

regards to volunteer recruitment, retention, and recognition.

Employee Engagement

APC employees were once again instrumental in planning meaningful activities for both staff and visitors in celebration of Pride and in recognition of the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation (Orange Shirt Day).

Volunteer Resources

In 2024, more than 1,100 dedicated volunteers contributed close to 88,000 hours of service. Their time, energy, and passion supported every department across the organization, significantly enhancing the visitor experience and the work of our staff.

Volunteers played vital roles at special events like Boo at the Zoo, Zoo Lights, Garden Party, Summer Entertainment Series, Brew at the Zoo, and Locked Zoo, in addition to their ongoing contributions as Zoo and Leaf Ambassadors. From painting fences and welcoming guests in the gardens to greeting thousands of students arriving on school buses, their impact was felt everywhere.

Youth volunteers donated 12,000 of the total hours, with 180 teens stepping up in Camp Crew, Zoo Ambassador, and Interpreter roles. Their warm smiles and helpful attitudes created positive, memorable interactions for guests all summer long.

Inclusive Park Upkeep Program

A notable addition in 2024 was the launch of the Inclusive Park Upkeep Program (IPUP). This initiative brought together volunteers with diverse abilities to form a twice-weekly work team. In warmer months, they painted fences, benches, and planters in the Zoo and Park; in colder seasons, they created enrichment items that support the wellbeing of Zoo animals.

In recognition of their exceptional teamwork, compassion, and impact, the IPUP team was honoured with the **Together We Achieve Award** at the annual volunteer appreciation banquet. Their collaborative efforts brightened our spaces and fostered a welcoming, inclusive volunteer community that truly embodies the spirit of APC.

Note 1 The Province of Manitoba has a \$30 million investment in the Leatherdale International Polar Bear Conservation Centre and Polar Bear Facilities, which include the Gateway to the Arctic Building, the Animal Holding and Filtration System Building and the Polar Plunge. As a result, the Province's \$30 million investment in these capital assets do not appear on the Conservancy's balance sheet.

Note 2 The Conservancy has internally restricted funds for a fiscal stabilization reserve to support the long-term sustainability of the organization.




